Reb Moshe's Message

Dear Haverim and Haverot,

Ann and I took a short trip to Israel at the end of October. My only brother and his family live there and we try to connect with them directly at least once a year. Being in Israel is always exciting in both positive and negative ways. The positive is seeing the vibrancy of life lived by Israelis. The negative is, like here in the States, the political polarization that continues despite the important issues Israel faces.

Nof synagogue which killed four Rabbis during morning services; attacks on the light rail stop that killed two and injured others; the shooting of Yehuda Glick, a right-wing advocate of Jewish prayer on the Temple mount; Molotov cocktails hurled at Israeli police in the Old City, all appear to be isolated and random. This is the way of terrorists. Tensions are always exacerbated by Jews moving into Silwan, an Arab neighborhood at the foot of the Temple Mount, as well as announcements of continued building of houses in East Jerusalem. Demolitions

of terrorist houses do little to alleviate the bitterness. Celebrations of terrorist activities in the West Bank and Gaza also add to the enmity that surrounds this complicated situation.

Of great concern were the events in Kfar Kana, an Israel Arab town in northern Israel. A terrible confrontation between Israel police and Arab citizens of Israel does not bode well. As you receive this I hope and pray that this turmoil will end and investigations will ensue about the circumstances surrounding the shooting of a Kfar Kana resident.

During our visit life in the city appeared normal. But the underlying fraying of relations between Jews and Arabs cannot be ignored.

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I always come away from Israel in a state of confusion. On the one hand, I see the need to maintain the status quo, especially in light of the turmoil in the Arab world that surrounds Israel, and on the other hand, I see the missed opportunities for moving forward towards some sort of accommodation with the Palestinians.

The 50-day War with Hamas over the summer lingers over the Land. There was no victory in this War on either side. It stopped the missiles hurled at Israel, but did nothing to assure that these actions will not take place again in the near future.

Jerusalem has become a focus of enormous tension. Terrorism, which has been on the wane over the last years, has renewed. The most recent attack in the Har

I have always been a centrist when it comes to politics both here and in Israel. The difficulty of energizing the vibrant center is frustrating. Can the forces of moderation and bi-partisan cooperation become more vocal? Can one get moderate folks to be extreme in their moderation? Can sane voices be heard above the din of extremism and its vitriolic vituperation?

The Saturday night we left Tel-Aviv for home, the first of two rallies marking the 19th anniversary of the assassination of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was held in Kikar Malchei Yisrael- the plaza of Tel Aviv's City Hall. This was the spot where Rabin was murdered by an Israeli who saw his historic acts of cooperation with the Palestinians in the Oslo agreement and in the peace accord with Jordan as threatening the welfare of Israel. We, too, have seen assassinations of Presidents, but the murder of Rabin was unprecedented. The instigation of this murder lay within the hateful political atmosphere which surrounded the elections of that year. It is sad to say that the political divide has sharpened over the last two decades.

The continued turmoil in Israeli-American relations and the heightened animosity for Israel in Europe and elsewhere are causes of great concern. The anti-Semitic nature of those who assail Israel does little to foster empathy for the cause of the Palestinians among Israelis or Jews around the world.

This seemingly unsolvable situation leads many of us who love Israel deeply to shy away from saying anything about Israel lest it be construed by either side of the internal Israeli political standoff as inappropriate. This does little to help us discuss the issues that are dear to our hearts. In my conversations with Israelis the "peace process" is not really on the agenda. Many are concerned less with the Israeli capacity to defend herself militarily against its enemies, which they are always prepared for, as they are with the fraying of internal Israeli society. As we, in this country, face the pain of an ever growing social and economic gap, so, too, does Israel face this growing divide. No country can enjoy real security without keeping its internal social fabric intact. The continued threat to democratic institutions is disturbing. A recent proposal in the Knesset that would allow it to overturn rulings of the Supreme Court is one blatant example. So, too, issues of religious pluralism and the treatment of minorities threaten the growth of democracy.

While Jews in the States drink in democratic principles as mother's milk, seeing Jewish and democratic values as indivisible, large segments of Israeli society do not share this conviction. In the States, too, there are many who would give up individual rights of privacy for security.

There are at least two dangerous aspects of this most complicated political situation: the first is falling into despair and the second is becoming frustrated with the conflict so that we take Israel off of our communal agenda.

At TBZ, we have, over the years, supported, and continue to support those institutions in Israel that are dedicated to

strengthening democratic values. We do not suggest that there are any easy solutions to the geo-political crises in the Middle East. We do, however, continue to express our love and concern for Israel by offering opportunities within our community to openly express ourselves about those issues that concern us deeply. We do not give in to despair. We seek an ongoing relationship between the Jews in the States and the State of the Jews. The fate of all Jews in the world is intertwined with Israel.

Whatever our political perspective I urge our community to remain steadfast in supporting Israel as the homeland of the Jewish people. Whatever our perspective I urge us to support those in Israel who express our values as Jewish-Americans. This is the best way for our two communities to remain in connection and solidarity.

It is difficult to hold complexity in our hearts and minds, but this is the challenge. Both sides of the Israeli divide are convinced that they are "saving" Israel from an existential threat.

It is important for us to express this solidarity by visiting Israel as a community or as individuals, especially those who have never visited before.

Some have asked if it was safe to visit Israel. These are individual decisions to be made. There is so much more to Israel than the City of Jerusalem. Those who visit the Galil and the coastal cities of Akko, Caesarea, and Tel Aviv will see a broader spectrum of Israel and as in most situations one can avoid troubled areas. While I understand the concern for safety I still urge us not to turn away from visiting Israel.

Join me in prayers for the safety of all in the Holy Land.

Message from Rav Claudia

Dear Haverot v'Haverim,

After the Holidays...

It's that time of year! Now that the intensity of the High Holidays has passed, we have begun to roll out programming to continue to strengthen our community at TBZ. I'd like to share with you some highlights of the events that are happening at TBZ this fall that make our community so wonderful.



This year we launched a new class, **Parenting Through a Jewish Lens**. Thirteen TBZ members, parents of children ages four months to nine years, are taking part in this 10-week program offered by Hebrew College and CJP's Commission on Jewish Life and Learning, and led by Reb Moshe and myself. This class has afforded us a unique opportunity to learn with other parents, both from TBZ and the larger community, exploring core values (*ikkarim*) that can strengthen our families, and enjoying rich conversations with other parents on topics that matter. This class is an opportunity for TBZ members to come learn, struggle, and celebrate together on issues related to Judaism and parenthood - I'm loving being a part of this class, not just as a teacher, but also as a learner.

There are more than thirty women signed up for the **Rosh Hodesh Group**, meeting monthly at the New Moon. We gather to learn and share about Judaism, our spiritual journeys, and our relationships with each other. Each month we focus on a theme, a question, a ritual, or an activity that connects to the month and to our interests. It is incredibly powerful to see the diversity of our community represented in this Rosh Hodesh Group, and we are looking forward to a year of connection, friendship, spiritual sharing and community. For the third year, there is also a **Rosh Hodesh Group for Teens**, led by Shira Lenza, with eight young women.

At the end of November (after this *Koleinu* has gone to press), **Mira Weisskopf** will celebrate her *Bat Mitzvah* at TBZ, the first person with major disabilities to do so. Mira has cognitive delays stemming from cerebral palsy and a traumatic brain injury, and is at risk of seizures. She is non-verbal and requires assistance for a variety of everyday tasks, such as eating, communicating, and moving from one place to another. Mira is happy and grounded, loves to engage with people, adores music and movement,

and has a deep love for Jewish ritual. Mira has been attending Sunday school at Gateways: Access to Jewish Education, for more than five years, and has been a part of the *Bnei Mitzvah* class there for past two years. Gateways' mission is to provide high quality special education services, expertise and support to enable students with diverse learning needs to succeed in Jewish educational settings and participate meaningfully in Jewish life. Mira will

use modern technology to lead the service and say the blessings of the Torah. In our last rehearsal, I was moved to tears to see Mira's excitement about being able to be close to the Torah and lead us in joyful worship. We are blessed to partner with Gateways on this journey with Mira. We are working to make TBZ a community inclusive of a diversity of abilities.



Beit Rabban has welcomed 46 students this year, our largest enrollment ever. Please read about our dedicated educational staff on page 12.

There is so much Happening at TBZ! I hope you are taking advantage of our adult learning opportunities, our social events, our family (*Mishpachot*) events and meditation (*Nishmat Hayyim*) opportunities, as well as opportunities to volunteer with our *Hesed* Committee and *Tikkun Olam* Group. If you are not sure where to start, please reach out and contact us. We will be delighted to connect you and help you find your place.





Tikkun Olam Group and Allies Pass Earned Sick Time for 900,000 Massachusetts Workers

On Nov 4th, Massachusetts became the third state in the nation to guarantee paid sick days for workers, with voters decisively approving a sick-leave ballot initiative, 60% to 40%. Under the measure known as Question 4, employers will have to provide their workers with one hour of paid sick time for every 30 hours they work, to be capped at 40 hours of leave for the year, starting on July 15, 2015. Workers can use the time when they are ill, injured, need to tend to a medical condition, or when a spouse, child or parent needs to be cared for.

TBZ's efforts made a huge difference. Over 25 of us from the Tikkun Olam Group, the whole TBZ congregation, the Jewish Labor Committee, JALSA (Jewish Alliance for Law and Social Action), SEIU (Service Employees International Union) and others, made thousands of calls at over 10 TBZ phone banks and, with volunteers from across the state, we helped improve the lives hundreds of thousands of low and middle income workers and their families. Special kudos are due to Deb Stang, the TBZ campaign co-chair, and Maggie Stein, who attended nearly every phone bank and was one of our most effective phone bank callers. We all deserve to celebrate.

While Massachusetts has near-universal health care, until this passed, one third of workers could not access that health care without the risk of losing their jobs. The passing of Question 4 now gives all workers the right to maintain their well-being and that of their families. And, businesses will benefit from healthier, more productive and more loyal employees.

Shmitta And Us: Shabbat Discussions Lead To Action

On October 25th, building on themes in the readings on Noah and his ark, we focused on the Shmitta/Sabbatical year and how we, at TBZ, can bring some of the values on Shmitta into reality in our Community. Rabbi Natan Margalit gave a Dvar torah describing some of the ideas that were discussed in classes he and Ilana Margalit taught this past year on Shmitta. He emphasized that one of the core ideas of Shmitta is that the land and all the bounty that we enjoy in life are not our property, but gifts. And, as with any gift, one should focus not on the object, but on the relationships that make those gifts possible. Building on the theme of our relationship to the land and the rest of creation, Stephane Acel-Green described his experience at the People's Climate March in New York City. After Kiddush, a group met with Natan, Rav Claudia and others to discuss what we can practically do to put these ideas into practice at TBZ. After discussing a number of ideas and possible courses of action, it was decided that the best way to proceed is to start with one or two "do-able" projects. Therefore, TBZ has embarked on improving the recycling and composting at Kiddush. Natan and Ilana will be giving a hands-on class on composting and, in coordination with all the relevant committees, we hope that we will be able to start composting the food waste from Kiddush. We will be improving the signage on the re-cycling center at Kiddush and also research what can be recycled or composed and what resources are available in Brookline. Please join us in these efforts!
